SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Dear donor:

Thank you for the funding you provided for the scholarship program at the Rohingya refugee camps. The 14 scholarship recipients are among the select few Rohingya children who have made it to secondary education – among the 1 million Rohingya living in the refugee camps. Your funds help empower these children to form a new generation of educated Rohingya.

Selected writings of some of the scholarship program recipients, as well as their photos can be seen in Appendix A. The monthly scholarship amounts received by each student can be seen in Appendix B. Finally, our charity bank account with all transactions of the last 6 months can be seen in Appendix C.

In admiration and anticipation of your support and generosity, the volunteer core of Extreme Poverty Projects will continue to ensure that 100% of your funds go to the needy on the ground. All administrative tasks on generating reports, making tax receipts, corresponding with the camps, liaison with donors and Revenue Canada, doing publicity, fundraising activities, and expenses associated with banking transactions and remittance transactions will continue to be covered and paid by us exclusively, so that every dollar of yours reach the needy.

We would like to take this opportunity to request for your continued support for our projects in 2019. Our current bank account stands at \$13,187 (as seen in Annex C) while our total anticipated cost of projects for 2019 is \$60,000 – this includes the cost of running a junior-high school of 120 students, a primary school of 80 orphaned children, a scholarship program for 14 Rohingya youth who have made it to colleges, 2 vocational sewing centers for 28 Rohingya women, and the camp-to-camp grassroots awareness program on child and sex trafficking. The estimated \$60,000 is exclusively the cost of running the programs on the grounds – there are no costs to the administrative works done in Canada, since they are all done on volunteer time and money.

Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh refer to the refugees from Myanmar living in Bangladesh, An estimated 8,50,000 to 9,50,000 Rohingya people have fled to Bangladesh since 25 August 2017, to avoid ethnic and religious persecution by Myanmar's Security Force. There are more 800,000

myanmar's security force. There are more 800,000 Rohingyas living in Bangladesh fled in earlier violence from the Burmese government over the three decades, officially. Myanmar government does not recognize the Rohingyas as lawful citizens. The government claims they were brought to Rakhine from Bangladesh during the time when Myanmar was a British colony, and the government says they are living in Myanmar illegally. The refugees who are living in Bangladesh are suffering from many humanitarian problems, they suffer from food, shelter, water, and sanitation problems, women and children are the worst sufferers. They have no scope to take a bath. For this they are becoming sick and getting affected by diseases. Now the government of Bangladesh (GoB) is working closely with UN and other agencies to establish a new 2000-acre site, site planners and engineers are working on access roads and layout of this large site to allow the provision of services, until then, services and assistance are still required in Rohingyas' villages throughout Cox's Bazar.

## The Rohingya story.

The Rohingya are an ethnic group, the majority of whom are Muslim, who have lived for centuries in the majority Buddhist Myanmar. Currently, there are about 1.1 million Rohingya in the Southeast Asian country.

The Rohingya speak Rohingya or Karingga, a dialect that is distinct to others spoken throughout Myanmar. They are not considered one of the country's 135 official ethnic groups and have been denied citizenship in Myanmar... since 1982, which has effectively rendered them stateless.

Nearly all of the Rohingya in Myanmar live in the western, coastal state of Rakhine and are not allowed to leave without government permission. It is one of the poorest states in the country, with ghetto-like camps and a lack of basic services and opportunities.

The Arakan Rohingya National Organisation said: "Rohingyas have been living in Arakan from time immemorial," referring to the area now known as Rakhine. During the more than 100 years of British rule (1824-1948) there was a significant amount of migration of labourers to what is now known as Myanmar from today's India and Bangladesh. Because the British administered Myanmar as a province of India, such migration was considered internal, according to Human Rights Watch.

Muslims have lived in the area now known as Myanmar since as early as the 12th century according to many historians and Rohingya groups. After the 1962 military coup in Myanmar things changed dramatically for the Rohingya. According to the most recently available data from the...

The Rohingya crisis in Myanmar has been a major humanitarian crisis. According to the United Nations in May, more than 168,000 Rohingya have fled Myanmar since following violence that broke out last year. More than 87,000 Rohingya fled Bangladesh from October 2016 to July 2017, according to the Iqra International Organization for Migration.
